Works continue to progress at the hotel. We are waiting for final quotes for rewiring the building and a new drainage system is being designed in conjunction with the housing development. We are working with HIE on the delivery of an Options Appraisal on the future management of the hotel. The outcome of the funding bid for renovating the bar area is expected by early 2024. Should the funding be successful, further discussions will take place regarding the renovation design.



Community Helipad

We are delighted to share that an opportunity has been secured to deliver a dedicated landing pad at the existing airfield to service helimeds. Following issues with emergency vehicle access onto the airfield, HELP Appeal were approached. The timing was just right as they were looking to fully fund the delivery of a landing pad in conjunction with the Royal Engineers who would like to build it. The project is fast moving as the Royal Engineers have limited availability and hope to construct the landing pad by the end of March 2024. Those involved locally with the emergency services have been approached for input and guidance, and a plan has been drawn up which will be submitted shortly for planning permission. The delivery of this project will ensure better access and care for both patients and emergency responders on the island.



Gigha Primary School

At the beginning of November we were awarded the Bronze Rights Respecting Schools Award and have received feedback on our silver action plan. This is a key milestone in our journey to ensure that children understand their rights and that these are central to the decisions that are made by themselves and others around them. As part of this pupils have been learning how children's rights have changed over time and this week we visited Inveraray Jail to find out how the rights of children differed in the nineteenth century. ELC pupils have also taken part in collaborative visits to Campbeltown with Rhunahaorine ELC which have included opportunities for joint play at the Indoor Soft Play and visits to the library to explore and take home new books to read.



We have also been developing links with our community partners and last month we hosted a visit from the island Minister, Lynn Peden, who shared family artefacts from the Second World War. Pupils also created their own Remembrance Wreath which was laid in the church on Remembrance Sunday.



As we approach Christmas, pupils have enjoyed helping out with island festivities. As well as making and delivering Christmas cards to all islanders, children in the Primary School have created six centre piece decorations for the Shopper Aid Christmas lunch; we have also begun rehearsals for our Christmas Performance which will be held on Friday 15th December in the Village Hall at 7pm.

We would like to thank Fyne Homes for their very generous donation to cover the cost of hiring the Village Hall for us. We would also like to thank all businesses who have kindly supported our wonderful wee school through sponsoring the cost of the performance and costumes. We could not have done it without you! We are still looking for raffle prizes and donations of home baking for the supper after the performance and hope to see as many of you there as possible.

Achamore Gardens

Early December saw International Volunteers Day celebrated, so we'd like to start by thanking all of our fantastic volunteers who help make Achamore better! Thank you to our regular volunteers who turn up week in, week out in all weathers, and cheerfully turn their hand to whatever task they're asked to do – they've donated many hundreds of hours to the garden over the last few years. Thank you to all the volunteers who came to our bulb planting day – between them, they managed to plant a remarkable 2,000 bulbs on the day, so next spring the garden will look amazing. And thank you to our "specialised" volunteers, from ditch clearers and wood processors to members of our steering group. Every single one of you has made such a difference to the restoration project, and we wouldn't be where we are now without you.

The end of November saw Euan and Jonny the tree surgeons back in the garden for a week, tackling a number of diseased, damaged and dead trees, focussing on trees that posed a risk to people, important plants or buildings. Many of the trees were challenging to fell, but none were more difficult than the big ash on the viewpoint path.

Unfortunately, this beautiful tree had to come down as it had been infected with Ash Dieback Disease which had progressed rapidly, causing lots of dieback in the crown, and it had already begun to shed small branches onto the path. Because of its location, the only option to safely fell it was for Euan to climb it and carefully dismantle it bit by bit, which took nearly 6 hours! Remarkably, not a single significant plant underneath it was damaged, and it was amazing to watch such skilled work being carried out. Our thanks go to Euan and Jonny for their hard work and professionalism.









All of that tree surgery means that we have a lot of clearing up to do, with lots of brash to deal with and tonnes of firewood to process. The gardens team, ably assisted by several of our volunteers, have made great progress tidying up the wood and are creating several new dead hedges from the brash. Dead hedges are a fantastic resource for insects, birds and many other small creatures and really help to improve the biodiversity of the site by providing shelter, nesting sites and feeding opportunities.

Achamore Gardens

The local robins didn't even wait for us to finish our first dead hedge – while we were still building it they were already making use of it, foraging for insects in the twigs and using it as an arena for their battles!

Finally this month, we've had great news from one of our funders, the National Trust for Scotland, who have agreed to pay for the initial design work for our proposed new plant propagation centre in the north walled garden,



and landscape architects Rankin Fraser have been appointed to do this work. Propagating our plant collection is crucial to the ongoing restoration and is the best, and often only, way to ensure it's survival, but we desperately need improved and enlarged facilities to allow us to do this important work well. We will be holding a community consultation event early next year to share our plans with you and gather your thoughts, so keep an eye out for that.

Gigha Ranger Service

It's almost the end of year 3! That is absolutely unbelievable, but what a year it has been: The Gateway to Gigha project was wrapped up earlier in the year; Argyll and Bute Council's Supporting Communities Fund has allowed us to continue Forest School for another twelve months; We were lucky enough to receive another round of funding to carry out some finishing touches to the path network; And we were awarded a whopping £248,000 to tackle the invasive non-native species across the island! On top of that we had our first two residential volunteer groups: 19th Argyll Scouts Group and Edinburgh Young Walkers, which were utterly fantastic; We hosted 20 engagement sessions and events; And we ran two projects with the Primary School. Our volunteers also have been INCREDIBLE this year, racking up 386 hours of volunteer time carrying out beach cleans, invasive removal, path maintenance, historical monument management and tree planting.

We want to say a massive thank you to everyone who has engaged with the Ranger Service this year, this role literally would not be possible without the community, and I am so grateful.

This month also saw our Forest School Extravaganza! Zoe Sills from Jackdaw Forest School joined us for a weekend of Forest School fun inspired by the barn owl that has recently been seen around the village. We spent the first evening hearing beautiful stories and poems about owls in the darkness, lit with fairy lights and accompanied by hot jacket potatoes and marshmallows on the fire.

Gigha Ranger Service

The second day was filled with wood whittling, exploring owl pellets, and trying our hand at an underground Dutch oven bread making session. Sadly this part was a little bit unsuccessful, but it's all lessons learned and we're ready to try again in the new year. We want to say a massive thank you to Zoe for making our weekend so special, sharing her skills and knowledge and simply being a fabulous example and practitioner. Forest School will start up again next year!





Path works

Due to extremely poor weather in November, the works for Dun Chibhich and Cuddyport have been put on hold until the spring. Fisherman's cave is now complete due to the addition of stepping stones from the roadside down to the beach to avoid the muddy sections at the start, and the aggregate addition to the Northern Loop is still ongoing.



Protecting Gigha's Woodlands Project

The project is well underway, and we are currently selecting contractors to carry out the invasive species removal and fencing of the hedgerows. Works for invasive removal are aiming to start as soon as possible in the new year, whilst the fencing will take place in the spring when the ground is drier.
